Garden Tips

- Have you noticed seed packages in the stores yet? Although it's tempting, don't start seeds indoors too early. Plants may get "leggy" if you don't follow directions on the package.
- If you want your ornamental grasses to fill out properly in the spring, now is the time to trim them. Ornamentals tend to become shabby and overgrown if left to themselves. Remember that liriodendron also need to be trimmed.
- Winter is a good time to cut the deadwood out of roses. Eighteen inches is probably a good length for branches, after trimming is complete. Also, we suggest trimming back to three main trunks of a mature bush.
- If the weather actually turns to winter, you may not want to use traditional ice removers. Our natural/organic fertilizer melts ice away just as effectively as salt. The low nitrogen levels of the fertilizer will not harm the Bay as it runs off. Call us if you'd like a bag delivered.

How About Natural/Organic Lawn Care This Year?

It's the time of year that most folks make decisions about their lawn care companies for the forthcoming season. This article may help you decide whether or not we are right for you.

Here are the highlights of our lawn care program:

- Combines organic fertilizers and composts with naturally occurring products to deter insects, fungus and diseases.
- 80% low-toxic/non-toxic products and methods without the use of harsh chemicals around your home and family.
- Fertilizer and calcium/lime applications are made in the spring and again in the fall. Any additional fertilizer treatments are based on the results of your soil test and will be applied only if absolutely necessary.

- Disease and fungus control is attained through the use of bacteria inoculated composts. Applications are made in April, May and late-June/early July. University research has confirmed a 95% control in expansive testing with composts.
- Insect deterrents for grubs, sod webworm and chinch bugs occur through biological and natural controls that are nontoxic to humans and animals. These applications are made in late-June/early July. Insects are also controlled through the use of endophyte-enhanced grasses. These grasses have been specifically bred to “taste bad” to surface feeding insects.
- Weed and crabgrass control is obtained through non-toxic/low-toxic intervention. You can expect a 3-5% natural weed involvement with our program.

Fire Department Announces Access Requirements for Emergency Vehicles

The St. Michaels Fire Department has announced guidelines for emergency access to the properties they serve. They request ten feet of both horizontal and vertical clearances. Clearance space is needed so that they can maneuver large emergency vehicles in a rapid response situation.

Please check your lanes and driveways for encroaching vegetation and overhanging trees. We will be happy to help you trim everything back to a manageable level and keep it that way to avert a potential medical or fire disaster.

The Fire Department does not have the authority to force property owners to cut back vegetation. However, they will not unnecessarily endanger their personnel to reach an inaccessible location.

When to Overseed

A lush green lawn doesn't usually just happen. Generally, when you see a beautiful lawn, it's the result of careful planning. Sometimes, it's also the result of blood, sweat and tears by the homeowner. That's where a lawn care company can help.

A lawn that is as dense as brand new sod will have the fewest weeds. To get a thick lawn, you'll need to overseed the lawn every fall, at least for the first couple of years.
